Beloved Spencer Woods Property Saved!

Mature Hardwood Trees Protected!

Efforts to secure funds needed to pay for the Spencer Woods Property received a major boost in October when the Town of Spencer was notified it received a \$200,000 grant from the N.C. Parks and Recreation Trust Fund (PARTF) for acquisition of the property. The Town of Spencer has agreed to take ownership of the property and maintain it as a passive recreation park.

The LandTrust acquired the property in February subject to a deed-of-trust financed by the previous owner, saving the 42-acre tract of rolling hills and mature hardwoods from a clear cut. "Several members of the community have already pledged significant amounts," reports Executive Director Jason Walser. "Those pledges, along with the PARTF grant, put the end of the acquisition phase of the project in sight," adds Walser, who notes the LandTrust is now looking for money for Phase II of the project, park development and maintenance.

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Seven Miles To Be Added to Uwharrie Trail!

Little Long Mountain Secured!

The LandTrust is very pleased to announce that the last gap in the Uwharrie Trail in Montgomery County is one step closer to being filled. The LandTrust had to act quickly to purchase Little Long Mountain, a one-of-a-kind property that was a "must-have" in order to complete the formerly 40-mile-long Uwharrie Trail. Although this property has been temporarily secured, the purchase was made with seller financing and we

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Milestone Projects Made Possible Thanks to Your Support!

Letter from The President, David Simmons

On August 20th, The Land Trust's annual RiverDance fundraising event was held. This year's event proved to be our most successful RiverDance ever. We had approximately 375 guests in attendance who enjoyed great food, great music, and sharing time with friends. On behalf of the board of directors, I would like to thank the staff, RiverDance committee, and others who volunteered their time to make this event a success. And finally, I want to thank you, our supporters, whose generosity enables us to continue our mission of "saving the places you love."

Given the economic climate that we are facing, your financial support speaks volumes of how you feel about the role that The Land Trust plays in protecting our lands. Some ongoing projects which warrant mentioning are the Springer Property, Spencer Woods, Capel, and Little Long Mountain.

The Springer property, 405 acres, is located between the Yadkin River and the South Yadkin River and will be an addition to adjacent properties that make up the "Two Rivers Project." With the addition of Springer, the project will consist of approximately 1400 acres. The city of Salisbury has agreed to contribute funding to this project as the intake for the city's water supply is located on the property. Funding has mostly been provided by a major benefactor with the balance of funding coming from Clean Water Management Trust Fund.

Spencer Woods consists of 42 acres and is located between Salisbury and Spencer. This project is being named in honor of Fred and Alice Stanback, and has been funded largely by private donations from friends and others who appreciate Fred's commitment to pro-

tecting our trees and lands. We were excited to learn in October that we also received funding from the NC Parks and Recreation Trust Fund for this project. We still need to raise funds to complete the development and implementation phase of the project, however.

The Capel property, in Montgomery County, overlooks Lake Tillery and is across the river from Morrow Mountain State Park. Our vision for this property originally was to incorporate it with Morrow Mountain, but with the current financial challenges impacting the

budgets of state agencies, that probably will not happen. We currently own 244 acres and have an option to purchase the remaining 64 acres. This option needs to be exercised in 2012. We are pursuing other potential partnerships with state and federal agencies.

The final acquisition property I will mention is Little Long Mountain, also in Montgomery County, and is approximately 250 acres. This property had to be purchased by The Land

Trust with owner financing. Once this property is paid for and transferred to a public agency, it will add about seven miles to the Uwharrie Trail and will complete the trail in Montgomery County.

In addition to the acquisition projects above, there are many conservation easements that are on a waiting list and being reviewed by staff and the board of directors. While these are admittedly hard times to raise funds for conservation, we feel obligated to take advantage of these once-in-a-lifetime opportunities to finish off large scale projects like the Uwharrie Trial, Two Rivers Preserve, and others that we have been working on for years. We are grateful for your support.

Spencer Woods Property Continued...

The LandTrust plans to honor long-time conservationists and philanthropists Fred and Alice Stanback with the project. "Fred and Alice have done so much for conservation in our region and across the Southeast. We felt a nature preserve of mature hardwoods in Fred's home community was an appropriate way to honor him," Walser says.

On September 17th The LandTrust hosted a nature walk on the property. Programming was provided by Lisa Wear and Anne Ellis of the Rowan County Schools Horizons Unlimited center. The program highlighted the property's biodiversity, studying its wildlife, aquatic species and hardwood forest. Approximately 60 people, most of them young children, attended the event. "There are so many special plant and animal communities here," says Lisa Wear. "This is a perfect location for this type of environmental programming."

We intend to host a feedback session soon where members of the community will be able to describe their vision for the property. In January, the NC Society of Landscape Architects will conduct a three-day planning charrette for the property using feedback gathered at the forum and input from other members of the community. "This park will be for the people of

Spencer and Salisbury to experience nature in a way that is unique for an urban setting," says Walser. "In this age of Nature Deficit Disorder, where kids suffer from mental disorders increasingly associated with lack of connection to nature, we feel the Spencer Woods property can be a true oasis for our whole community. We truly believe that these woods will be an asset for all in Spencer and Salisbury, old and young, rich and poor."

Another Portion of Knox Family Farm Protected!

This summer The LandTrust completed conservation of the 194-acre Lois Knox property in western Rowan County. The farm is in an important conservation area for The LandTrust; several other landowners in the area have given conservation easements to The LandTrust, including almost 400 acres conserved by other members of the Knox family.

Transaction funding for this project was provided by the North Carolina Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Development and Farmland Preservation Trust Fund. Sadly, Lois Knox died as we were completing work on this easement, but her heirs, Ben Knox and wife Angela Knox, Robert Knox II, and wife Karen Knox, and Clark Knox, completed the easement donation according to their aunt's wishes. We wish to thank everyone involved in this project, including the Knox family who graciously saw through what their Aunt


are seeking funds to pay off the outstanding deed of trust so that we can get this property into formal public ownership.

This 250-acre property houses the peak of Little Long Mountain, boasts unique panoramic views of the Uwharrie Mountains, possesses a rare glade community, buffers the “outstanding resource waters” of Poison Fork, and is home to timber rattlesnake, box turtles, and many other neat plants and animals.

Now that The LandTrust has control of this property, we are one step closer to reconnecting the trail. With one other willing seller of a small parcel in Randolph County we could develop a new trailhead on High Pine Church Road and add another seven miles to the existing trail.

By securing Little Long Mountain alone, however, we can begin to rebuild the trail and immediately add nearly six miles of new trail through the use of existing dirt roads.

The LandTrust is forming a committee to get the trail on the ground and welcome volunteer help, both in fundraising to finish the property purchase and to develop the trail. “With this recent purchase of Little Long Mountain we have taken on debt to secure the opportunity to reconnect the largest portion of the Uwharrie Trail previously in private ownership, and with it provide a one-of-a-kind amenity for the Piedmont” says LandTrust Director Jason Walser. “But with state and federal conservation funds at their lowest, community support will be key in making this vision happen.”

Hoffner Family Dairy Preserved in Rowan County!

In September The LandTrust completed the permanent conservation of a 261-acre organic dairy farm in western Rowan County. George Hoffner and his wife, Evelyn, along with their son Alan and his wife, Connie, placed conservation easements on the property. Alan and his son, Chris Hoffner, work the farm and transitioned the dairy to certified organic (currently operating under an agreement with Organic Valley) in 2006 and 2007. The property has been run as a dairy by the Hoffner family since the 1950s.

The transaction was assisted with funding from the North Carolina Agricultural Development and Farm-land Preservation Trust Fund, administered by the North Carolina Department of Agriculture, and the Federal Farm & Ranch Protection Program, administered by the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). "This is a great example of the Federal and state governments working together with a local land trust to help a family insure the future of their farm," says Andrew Waters, operations director at The LandTrust who wrote the original grant applications and helped guide the project to completion. Funding from the two grants will be used to help Alan Hoffner secure his father's interest in the property. Many farms are

put in jeopardy because of insufficient transition planning and as result are sold. "I really want to congratulate the Hoffner family for recognizing this situation and working with us to prevent it," Water said.

Waters adds that LandTrust consultant Steve Blount and local NRCS district conservationist Larry Hendrix, along with local attorney Andy Abramson, were instrumental in the conservation effort. Waters comments, "As land conservation projects go, this one was very complex. Everyone involved worked very hard and put their faith in the importance of this effort."

Unique Conservation Properties for Sale




